Seedlings (SDLG) are young trees selected directly from that seedbed after they are one – three years old.

Transplants (TP) have been transplanted from the seed bed and allowed to grow another one or two years in a transplant bed.

## VARIETIES

### **Colorado Blue Spruce** (Picea Pungens Glauca)

Slow growing, densely formed tree with stiff, silvery blue to bluish green needles. An excellent ornamental and background tree. Thrives in dry, well-drained soil. Grows to 100 feet and 15-25 feet in crown diameter.

### **White Spruce** (Picea Glauca Lake States)

Moderate growing tree with bluish –green needles and short dense branches . A popular Christmas tree as well as an ornamental and windbreak tree. Endures drought conditions. Grows to 60 ft. tall and 10-20 feet in crown diameter.

### **Norway Spruce** (Picea Abies)

Fastest growing spruce with dark green needles and draping branches. Good ornamental or windbreak use. Grows well in most conditions. Grows to 100 feet tall and 25-30 feet in crown diameter.

### **Balsam Fir** (Abies Balsamea-Eastern Strain)

The traditional Christmas tree has soft, bright green needles. Excellent fragrance with good needle retention. Prefers well-drained, acidic, moist soil. Full to partial sun. Medium growth ...75 feet.

### **White Pine** (Pinus Strobus Lake States)

Vigorous growing, open tree with long, soft bluish-green needles. Used in ornamental plantings. Tolerates shade and grows well in sandy and other soils. Grows over 100 feet tall. 40-50 feet in crown diameter.

### **Norway (Red) Pine** (Pinus Resinosa)

Rapid growing tree with 4-6” long, glossy dark green needles. It has many uses; timber, windbreak, ornamental and Christmas tree. Does well in sandy, dry soil. Grows over 80 feet tall and 20-40 feet in crown diameter.

### **Red Oak** (Quercus Rubra)

Fast growing and long-lived oak which forms a narrow round-topped crown. This acorn tree provides food and shelter for wildlife and can tolerate city conditions. Valuable lumber for market. Grows 80-90 feet tall and 45 feet in crown diameter.

### **Swamp White Oak** (Quercus Bicolor)

One of the fastest growing oaks . Forms large canopy. Prefers moist to wet sites with some drought tolerance. Shiny dark green leaves . Yellow to purple fall color. Their sweet acorns are great for wildlife. Medium to fast growth 80-100 feet.

### **Sugar Maple** ( Acer Saccharum)

Slow to medium growth. Outstanding native shade tree. Dark green leaves turn yellow to orange to fiery red in fall. Grows in most soil types. Sap used for maple syrup. Used for ornamental, lumber and wildlife habitat. Height 100 feet.

### **Silver Maple** (Acer Saccharinum)

Your best pick for quick shade. A very hardy, easy to grow tree that will tolerate a wide variety of soils. Bright yellow leaves in the fall. One of the best trees to grow where few others will survive. Grows up to 60 feet and 35-50 feet in crown diameter.

### **Hybrid Poplar** (Imperial Carolina)

Disease resistance and very vigorous. Large leaves giving lots of shade in a hurry. Soil Adaptable. Fast growth-80-100 feet with 8-10 feet growth per year.

## WILDLIFE SHRUB PACKAGE

### **American Plum** ( Prunus– Americana)

Small tree or large shrub. White flowers in early May. Edible fruits-red or yellow. Very hardy & drought resistant. Excellent for wildlife plantings. Grows 15-20 ft.

### **Red Osier Dogwood** (Cornus Sericea)

Dense growing shrub with striking red bark in the winter. Clusters of beautiful white blossoms followed by purple fall berries are a major food source for migrating birds. Dark green waxy leaves. Fast growth...10 feet.

### **High Bush Cranberry** (Viburnum Trilobum)

White flowers in clusters in May. Beautiful lustrous green leaves followed by scarlet red fruits and leaves in fall. Fast growth...8-12 feet

### **Ranetka Crab** (Malus X Ranetka)

Great in extreme cold. Vigorous grower with fragrant white flowers. Excellent form with straight trunk. Red nickel size fruit. Birds feast on this crab. Fast growth....40 feet.

**Black Cherry** (Prunus Serotina) Excellent ornamental. Pink to white flowers followed by edible scarlet fruit in June. Attractive soft green foliage. Good for wildlife, highly prized wood. Grows 8-10 feet...Spreads 6-10 feet.
